1. Background

Under section 20 of the Fair Access to Regulated Professions and Compulsory Trades Act, 2006 (FARPACTA), which is substantially similar to section 22.7(1) of Schedule 2 of the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991 (RHPA),

"A regulated profession shall prepare a fair registration practices report annually or at such other times as the Fairness Commissioner may specify or at such times as may be specified in the regulations".

Section 23 of FARPACTA and Section 22.9 of Schedule 2 of the RHPA then go on to indicate that the Fairness Commissioner shall specify the form in which these reports shall be prepared, along with the required filing dates. This section also stipulates that a regulator must make these reports public.

It is pursuant to these authorities that the Office of the Fairness Commissioner (OFC) has required that each regulator complete its 2023 Fair Registration Practices Report (FRP).

Please note that this report covers the time-period from January 1 to December 31, 2023.

The FRP:

- Collects information about the organization, applicants to the profession and current membership.
- Provides information to the public about how the organization has implemented fair registration practices during the reporting period.
- Helps the OFC to successfully undertake the education and compliance activities which include monitoring, applying a risk-informed compliance framework, assessing performance, and sharing best practices.
- Determines whether the regulator is complying with recently enacted legislative and regulatory provisions designed to reduce barriers for domestic labour mobility and internationally trained applicants.
- Identifies trends across regulated professions and regulated health colleges.

Please note that the 2023 version of the FRP has changed from the previous version in terms of both form and content as the OFC's enabling statutes have evolved and as the office migrates to a more permanent portal-enabled database solution.

Fair access legislation requires regulators to take reasonable measures to ensure that any third parties undertake assessment of qualifications in a way that is transparent, objective, impartial and fair.

College of DENTURISTS of Ontario takes the following measure(s) to ensure fair and timely assessments:

World Education Services or equivalent organization (as recognized by the Alliance of Credential Evaluation Services of Canada as an approved assessment agency), are used by applicants of the College to authenticate their original academic credentials. The College does not use these third-party service providers to conduct the evaluation of academic credentials (it is conducted by the Registration Committee for equivalency purposes), but rather authenticate that the academic credentials submitted are genuine, its potential equivalency to a Canadian educational program, a potential copy of their diploma/degree that

was awarded, and the original language of teaching used during the program to determine language proficiency.

5. Accomplishments, risks and mitigations

Key accomplishments and risks pertaining to fair registration practices during the reporting period are summarized below.

A. Accomplishments

- Creation and deployment of the all new all online application process. The CDO has soft launched an all-new applicant portal in November 2023. Previously applicants submitted the required documentation electronically by email, postal mail, or courier. The all-new applicant portal digitizes all aspects of registration where the applicant can easily upload all required documentation in the applicant portal and complete any forms. The applicant portal also contains an all new graphic widget that displays the applicant's current registration stage, an explanation of their stage, what is required for that stage, and their progress towards licensure. This allows applicants to follow along their registration progress and anticipate what is required for the next stage. As well, a secure document management portal was created to allow applicants to scan or upload electronic documentation to support their applications. Prior to this, applicants had to mail or courier their documents to the College, now applicants can upload the required documents online at their convenience. The new online applicant portal is available as an option for new registrations in 2023 and first half of 2024 (with the paper based or electronic form based still available). The CDO will transition to the full use of the applicant portal by the second half of 2024.
- 2 Establishment of the Emergency Class of Registration. In order to operationalize the goals of the Government of Ontario and as ordered by the Chief of Nursing and Professional Practice, the CDO mobilized the whole of the organization to draft and create the Emergency Class of Registration in under 6 months. This included the drafting and consultation of the Registration Regulation, updating the College By-Laws including its consultation, establishment of a new class of fees, training of College Staff,

and developing an online portal to apply for this Class of Registration. All in all, College Staff, College Legal Counsel, and Council worked diligently to establish this new Class of Registration that came into force on August 31, 2023.

B. Risks and Mitigations

In 2023, the College began scheduling monthly meetings for the Registration Committee regardless of potential pending case files. Previously, the Committee would only meet ad hoc based on case files received. This allows greater certainty on meeting attendance and clarity of timelines for applicants.

As part of the Strategic Plan, the CDO will review its policies and practices to ensure inclusivityand to reduce any registration barriers.

Accreditation of educational programs	Yes	The CDO since 2020 has embarked on the accreditation initiative to review and accredit all Denturism programs in Canada. In 2023, the majority of Denturism programs have received their initial accreditation status with one remaining program scheduled for their accreditation review in 2024. This would better facilitate inter-provincial labour mobility transfers and allow graduates from other provinces to begin their licensure journey in Ontario in a much quicker and efficient way as all Canadian programs are accredited nation wide. The CDO would continue to conduct academic assessments for internationally educated applicants. In 2023, the Superintendent of Private Career Colleges, in an effort to bolster support and resources for students of private career colleges, undertook work on a draft policy directive that would strengthen reporting requirements and transparency requirements for current or prospective students of private career college programs that have not yet undergo accreditation or will be reviewed shortly. The timely policy directive would strengthen accountability for private career colleges should the program ultimately be unsuccessful in its accreditation review. The CDO worked with the Ministry of Colleges and Universities along with staff from the Superintendent of

		Private Career Colleges to assist with their development of the policy directive. The CDO reviewed the draft policy directive in depth and had opportunities to be consulted upon and provide feedback throughout the year. The policy directive was approved for implementation January 1, 2024, and the CDO continues to support the Office of the Superintendent of Private Career Colleges in our joint efforts to protect students and provide them with a smooth, efficient, and timely registration process. In 2024, the Superintendent will work with the CDO to develop an information sharing MOU to foster collaboration between the two organizations.

The portal has a built in widget that displays their current registration stage, information on the next stages, and allows applicants to follow along their licensure journey.
Steps to address labour shortages in the profession or trade	Yes	The College routinely meets with relevant stakeholders including denturism regulators from across Canada to discuss how it can play a role in addressing labour shortages and ensure there is proper distribution of Denturists across Canada to serve the needs of Canadians. As part of its routine meetings, the College held conversations with Denturism regulators from the atlantic provinces and northern territories to facilitate timely labour mobilities. For Denturists who wishes to practice in underserved communities in northern provinces or territories or who require good standing documentation for volunteer opportunities, the College waives any fees related to the issuance of good standing letters. As part of those discussions, there was agreement that moving from locally administered examinations to a multijurisdictional model would allow greater mobility in Canada as the examination results would be transferable between provinces and regulators. The College will continue its work on the multi-jurisdictional OSCE portion of the examinations.

7. Membership and application data

The Office of the Fairness Commissioner collects membership and application data from regulators through annual Fair Registration Practices Reports, which are also made available to the public. Information is collected for the purpose of discerning statistical changes and trends related to a regulator's membership, application volumes, licensure/certification results, and appeals year over year.

8. Changes Related to New Legislative and Regulatory Requirements

By Ontario law, regulated occupations must provide registration practices that are transparent, objective, impartial and far. Non-health occupations are governed by the *Fair Access to Regulated Professions and Compulsory Trades Act, 2006 (FARPACTA)*, while health professions are governed by *the Regulated Health Professions Act, 2011 (RHPA)*.

In 2021, both statutes were amended to incorporate substantive provisions to:

- **A.** Eliminate the use of Canadian experience requirements except under prescribed circumstances.
- **B.** Streamline language proficiency testing requirements.
- **C.** Provide for the continuity of registration processes during emergency situations.
- **D.** Set registration time limits. (FARPACTA only)

College of DENTURISTS of Ontario has made the following changes to comply with these new legal obligations:

A. Canadian Experience

Change required: No changes required

College of DENTURISTS of Ontario has taken the following measures to comply with legislative requirements on eliminating Canadian experience requirements unless an exemption is granted or an alternative is identified that meets criteria prescribed in regulations (non-health regulators) or the exceptions in legislation are met (regulated health colleges).

B. Language Proficiency Testing

C. Emergency Registration

The College hosted two special council meetings and three council meetings to approve the establishment of an Emergency Class of Registration by drafting amendments to the Registration Regulation, completing the regulation submission template, conducting 60-day stakeholder and public consultation, amending the College By-Laws including amending its Registration Year End, conducting a 60-day stakeholder and public consultation on the by-law changes, updating the fee schedule for the Emergency Class, and working with the database provider to create an all new online application process for the emergency class. The Emergency Class of Registration came into effect August 31, 2023.

Glossary of terms

Applicant: An individual who has applied for membership in a regulated profession or compulsory trade, with the associated rights to practice their profession / trade or use a professional title.

Domestic labour mobility: Applications subject to the Canadian Free Trade Agreement, which stipulates that a certificate issued by one province or territory should be recognized by all others unless there is an exception due to public health, safety and security reasons.

Internationally educated / trained: An individual whose initial professional education was not from a Canadian educational institution, or who is applying for trade certification based on experience gained outside Canada. This category includes individuals with education / training in the US and other countries. It also includes individuals who completed their initial professional education outside Canada and later addressed gaps with courses or a bridging program based in Canada.

Jurisdiction of initial training: For professions, the jurisdiction in which an applicant obtained their initial professional education used in full or partial fulfilment of registration requirements. For trades, the jurisdiction of initial trade experience listed on a Trades Equivalency Assessment (TEA) application.

Member: An individual who has satisfied the conditions for registration in their profession / trade and has been granted the right to practice and/or the right to use a professional designation or title. Members may hold a full license to engage in independent practice, or they may hold an alternate class of registration.

Racial identity: Voluntary self-report data of racial identity as a social description. Follows categories identified in the Ontario Anti-Racism Directorate Data https://www.ontario.ca/document/data-standards-identification-and-monitoring-systemic-racism.

Registration requirements: the entry-to-practice requirements that that an applicant must meet to be granted full membership in a regulated profession or trade, with the associated right to practice or right to use a professional title.

- **Academic requirement**: The formal education, or equivalent, that is required for licensing or certification in a particular regulated profession or trade.
- **Experience requirement:** The experiential training or work experience that is required for licensing or certification in a particular regulated profession or trade.
- **Language requirement**: The level of language proficiency that is required for licensing or certification in a particular regulated profession or trade, and the language proficiency tests accepted in fulfillment of this requirement.

Third party service provider: An external organization that assesses applicant qualifications on behalf of the regulator.
